Snipe Hunter

Attach:

1: Make sure the firearm is UNLOADED

2: Spin on firmly hand tight

Optional: If the suppressor is to remain threaded on the rifle, apply a small dab of anti-seize to prevent rust on the barrel threads.

Remove:

1: Make sure the firearm is UNLOADED

2: Spin suppressor off by hand or use an

adjustable wrench to loosen.

Caution: Suppressors get HOT! Use welding gloves, an oven mitt, or just give it 10 minutes before removing.

Cleaning: Rimfire cans need frequent cleaning. The more rounds through the suppressor between cleanings, the more work you will have. Try to clean at least every 200 rounds.

Cleaning:

- 1: If baffles are seized in the tube, plug the endcap with the included rubber plug and fill with BoreTech C4 carbon remover or FrogLube Super Degreaser.
- 2: Let sit overnight.
- 3: Plug the threaded adapter with your thumb and shake vigorously.
- 4: pour the contents out and remove the endcap.
- 5: you should now be able to push the baffles out of the tube with a 3/8 wood dowel.
- 6: Use an old toothbrush and pick to clean baffle surfaces, paying attention to the small ridges on the outside diameter of the baffles.
- 7: use the old toothbrush and compressed air to clean tube threads.
- 8: Re-assemble. IMPORTANT: <u>The baffle with the</u> <u>letters "TI" on the side needs to go in first. The</u> <u>short baffle with a cup only .200" deep goes in last.</u>
- 9: Tighten up the endcap and then wipe the whole thing down with any non-abrasive cleaner.

The threaded adapter does not need to be removed from the tube. It is installed with Rocksett threadlocking compound and damage will occur without releasing the thread lock.
